- Characters/setting

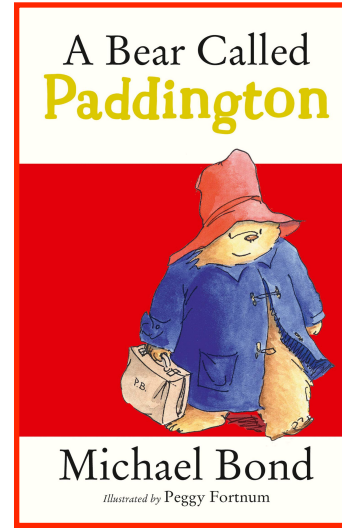
Key Vocabulary

purpose	the reason why something is done or created

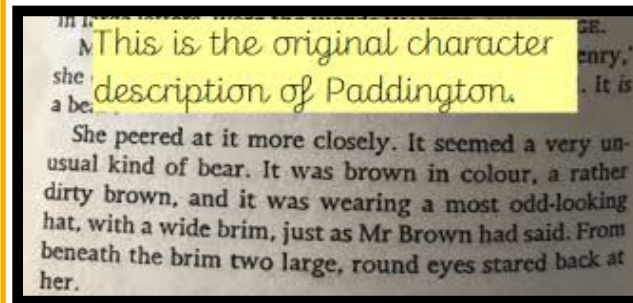
A Bear Called Paddington

He had travelled all the way from Darkest Peru with only a jar of marmalade, a suitcase and a label reading 'Please look after this bear'.



Michael Bond was born in Newbury, Berkshire, in 1926 and grew up in Reading. The inspiration for his most famous creation was based on a lone **teddy bear** he noticed on a shelf in a London store near **Paddington Station** on Christmas Eve 1956, which he bought as a present for his wife.

glossary	a glossary is like a dictionary, which explains what key words from the leaflet/text mean
diagram	a labelled picture to make the information easier to understand
